Daniel W. Vooyo

“Mr. Philatelic Literature”

Daniel W. Vooyo was once called Mr. Philatelic Literature by George W. Linn, founder of *Linn's Stamp Weekly*. Dan believed that philatelic literature was indispensable for the serious philatelist.

A dedicated philatelist and bibliophile, Dan started the *Philatelic Literature Review* in September 1942, serving as editor from 1942 to 1956 and later 1963 to 1970. This became the official publication of the Philatelic Literature Association.

Dan was selected by American Philatelic Society President Edward Willard to chair an ad hoc committee to study the feasibility of the Society creating a philatelic library. The American Philatelic Research Library was incorporated October 28, 1968.

The 4th quarter 1969 *Philatelic Literature Review* announced that starting with the 1st quarter 1970, the *PLR* would become the official publication of the fledgling American Philatelic Research Library. That issue also included the announcement of the various categories of membership in the library, including Founder status.

Dan was President of the APS from 1969 to 1973. He also served as the APS representative to the Federation Internationale de Philatelie (FIP) and served on the FIP Board of Directors.

Dan was one of five people to have won two Luff Awards, the highest award given by the APS.

We hope you will honor Dan by supporting the American Philatelic Research Library, and become a Daniel W. Vooyo Fellow.

The American Philatelic Research Library

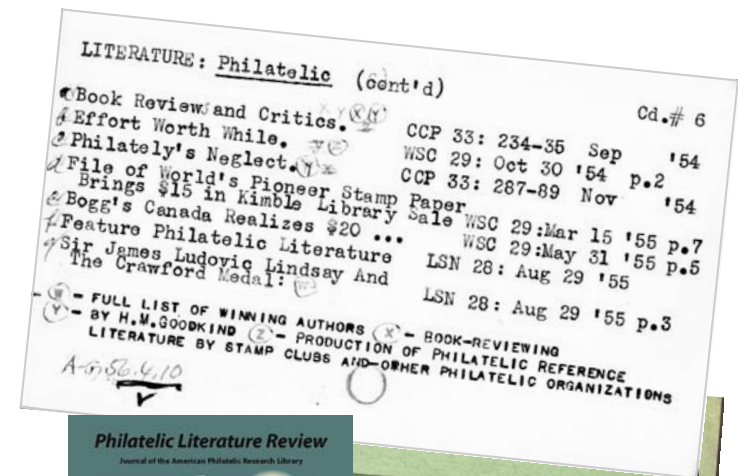
The APRL has one of the world's largest and most accessible collections of philatelic literature. The collection includes books and journals about stamps and postal history, the history of philately, and related subjects like transportation and geography.

Special collections and archives include the Daniel Hines Air Mail Archives; the American First Day Cover Society Archives; the APRL Clipping Files; the Elliott Perry – Cyril dos Passos correspondence files; post office documents collections; and the libraries of several specialty societies.



Visitors to the Library, located together with the American Philatelic Society at the American Philatelic Center in Bellefonte, Pa., are welcome to browse nearly three miles of shelving, and the friendly staff are ready to help with research questions.

For those who can't visit the Library in person, the APRL provides copying, scanning, and book loan by mail services.



The APRL online catalog lists the book and journal holdings of the Library, and serves as the Philatelic Union Catalog, allowing users to simultaneously search the holdings of multiple philatelic libraries and a journal article index.

The *Philatelic Literature Review* is the APRL quarterly journal and features news and articles about philatelic literature, libraries, and research.
